INTRODUCTION

Dear Parents,

Assalamu'alaikum wa Rahmatullahi wa Barakaatuhu,

May I take this opportunity to welcome you to Al-Ashraf Secondary School for Girls, established in 1994 by the Gloucester Muslim Welfare Association Ltd. (GMWA) and now under the proprietorship of Al-Madani Educational Trust, Registered Charity No. 1134963.

May Allah (SWT) reward you for showing concern for your daughter's education and Islamic welfare; a parental duty assigned to us by none other than our Creator, Allah (SWT).

"O you who believe! Save yourselves and your families from that fire (of the hereafter) whose fuel is human beings and stones" (Al-Qur'an: Surah Al-Tahrim 66:6)

Our beloved Prophet, Rasulullah (sallallahu alaihi wa sallam) has also reminded us,

"Beware! Each one of you is a shepherd and each one of you shall be questioned concerning his flock; a leader is a shepherd of his people, and he shall be asked concerning his flock; and a man is a shepherd of his household and he shall be asked concerning his flock; and a woman is a shepherd of her husband's house and over their children, and she shall be questioned concerning them." Since its modest beginnings in 1994 with just two classes and 36 students, Al-Ashraf Secondary School for Girls has evolved into a successful non-selective secondary school, consistently aiming to provide an excellent standard of secular and Islamic education. Our school's growth is mirrored in the upward trajectory of its GCSE results which have consistently been above local and national averages in recent years. The school received a successful Ofsted inspection in November 2019 and attained 'Good' judgements in all areas.

The inspectors acknowledged and praised the many improvements made since our previous inspection in 2017. We were delighted with this, especially with the acknowledgement of the positive impact the school is having on pupils' achievement and the quality of education we offer.

The proprietorial trust and the governing body remain ambitious for pupils. They aim for pupils to be confident British Muslim young women when they leave. They communicate this expectation well to parents and staff.

Pupils are **well** prepared for the next stage in their education. The proportion of pupils that attain a standard pass in both English and mathematics GCSE is high. GCSE results in the other subjects are strong. All pupils go on to further study or training when they leave Year 11.

Ofsted also praised pupil conduct and its impact on academic success:

Pupils' respectful conduct is a **strong** factor in their academic success. Pupils complete classwork and homework diligently. Parents support the school strongly.

The school adopts the path of moderation and ensure pupils gain an understanding of other faiths and beliefs. This too was acknowledged by Ofsted:

The school encourages pupils to develop a broad understanding of different faiths. For example, all pupils study GCSE religious studies and benefit from a link with the local Anglican Church. Teachers thread positive messages about moral and social issues throughout the curriculum. They prepare pupils well for life in modern Britain. This is one of the school's strengths. Our Islamiat Curriculum (see section on Islamiat Curriculum) covers a broad range of Islamic subjects using textbooks in English taught by qualified Mu'allimaat/Aalimaas. (Female Islamic scholars). Al-Ashraf Secondary School for Girls School Rules



Parents/carers are requested to go through the school rules and carefully with their daughters.

They should be read in conjunction with the **school behaviour and attendance policies.**

The school is a happy harmonious learning community where staff and pupils feel safe and secure. School life is characterised by a calm purposeful environment underpinned by relationships built upon mutual respect. Our expectation is that all pupils will behave in appropriate and socially acceptable ways.

1) Attendance and Punctuality

- Authorised absences are mornings or afternoons away from school for a good reason such as illness
 or other unavoidable causes. Unauthorised absences are those which the school does not consider
 reasonable and for which no permission has been given. (see Attendance policy for details)
- Pupils must arrive punctually to school. If registration is taking place away from the classroom, e.g. science lab or ICT suite, pupils must arrive before 8.45am in the mornings and 1:45 pm in the afternoons to avoid a late mark.
- Permission must be obtained from the Head Teacher/Deputy Head to be absent for any reason other
 than illness. If such permission is not obtained then a phone call to the school must be made in the
 first instance for any unauthorised absence. The school will also contact parents by phone in the
 mornings/afternoons to notify them if their daughter is absent. Ofsted regulations clearly state that
 pupils cannot stay at home to look after siblings, visit relatives, go to airports and go on shopping
 trips etc. during school time.
- No one will be allowed to leave the school premises during break times. At lunch time, only pupils living locally will be able to go home for lunch provided parents give consent. Pupils should go home immediately and avoid loitering in the streets/shops and behaving in a disorderly manner. If pupils make a habit of returning late to school in the afternoons, the option of being allowed to go home for lunch will be taken away from them.
- Medical, dental or other appointments should be kept outside school hours. If for some unavoidable reason, an appointment has to be kept during school hours, prior permission must be obtained if possible. An appointment card MUST be shown to the school office.

2) Conduct

- Behaviour must be courteous at all times and movement around the school should be orderly. Rude
 and insulting language will never be tolerated and appropriate sanctions will be applied as per school
 behaviour policy.
- Respect for teachers, all members of staff and fellow pupils should be shown at all times.
- Pupils should display a willingness to apply themselves during lessons at all times and develop an aptitude for learning. Homework should be completed appropriately and on time. Thorough revision is essential for all assessments, tests and end-of-year exams.
- Pupils must read, understand, sign and adhere to the pupil IT acceptable use policy.
- Break times must be spent outside in the playground, unless there is heavy rain. At lunch times, pupils must eat their lunch sitting down in the dining area of the hall.

- Name calling, teasing and all other forms of bullying will never be tolerated and will be dealt with appropriately according to the school anti-bullying policy. (Refer to Anti-Bullying policy)
- Pupil should bring a nutritious snack/well-balanced lunch to school. Chewing gum is strictly prohibited on school premises. (Refer to Healthy Eating policy)
- All pupils must be punctual with their Salaah and when unable to perform Salaah, the time should be spent in Zikr.

3) Uniform and Personal Appearance

- Correct uniform must be worn at all times including journeys to and from school and during school outings, unless otherwise specified. A uniform pass must be obtained from the school office if incorrect uniform is worn due to a valid reason.
- The *hijaab* should be worn neatly at all times. A safety pin or scarf pin can be used to hold the *hijaab* in place.
- Jewellery and make up (including nail varnish) must not be worn.

4) Personal Property and Forbidden Articles

- All personal property **must** be clearly marked with the name of the owner. P.E. kit must not be left at school, but should be taken home for washing after every lesson.
- Inappropriate books/magazines, cameras, IPads, IPods, mp3/4 players, electronic games, valuables, excessive amount of money etc. should not be brought into school and will be confiscated.
- Mobile Phones may be brought into school, but should be handed into the school office each
 morning and collected at the end of the school day. Phones not handed in will be confiscated and
 returned only at the end of the term.
- All school property should be duly respected. In the event of loss or damage, a replacement fee will be charged. This includes official school forms handed out to pupils i.e., Detention Forms, Report Acknowledgement Forms etc. Textbooks and exercise books must <u>NOT</u> be de-faced with graffiti.

5) Homework

• Homework diaries/school planners must be brought to school daily. These should be filled in everyday with details of homework, signed by parents/carers and countersigned by subject teachers. Parents should ensure that all homework is completed thoroughly and on time.

School Uniform

School uniform plays a key role in promoting pride, self-confidence, and a feeling of belonging within the student community.

All students are required to follow the school uniform guidelines at all times.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

- Crested blazer (Only available from school uniform shop)
- Navy school abaya (Only available from school uniform shop)
- Navy school burkhi (Only available from school uniform shop)
- Navy or black plain socks
- Black flat soled school shoes (No boots or sandals).
- School coat (NOT to be worn in class, for outdoors only)

P.E Kit

- Navy blue or black loose-fit jogging bottoms
- Navy blue T- shirt with long sleeved navy or black sweatshirt (without a hood)
- Navy blue burkhi
- White, black or navy sports trainers (Velcro or laced)
- P.E kit must be brought into school on PE days only and taken home at the end of the day.
- PE Kit left in school will be disposed of without warning.

Other important information

- <u>Jewellery</u>: A wristwatch, small ear studs and a plain nose-stud are permitted
- All other jewellery is not permitted and will be confiscated for the school term
- Nail varnish & make up are not permitted. Any students found to be breaching these rules will be sent home until uniform offence is rectified.

Rewards and Sanctions at Al-Ashraf Secondary School for Girls

Rewards

At Al–Ashraf Secondary School we want all our pupils to excel at Academic and Islamic knowledge and Akhlaq (behaviour/Manners). To motivate the pupils we have a reward system whereby pupils' good work and behaviour is recognised using a series of certificates.

Pupils have the opportunity to earn Merit Marks for good work and effort.

50 Merit Marks = Bronze Certificate

100 Merit Marks = Silver Certificate - £5.00 cash Prize

150 Merit Marks = Gold Certificate - £5.00 cash prize + Gift

During the year, various types of rewards are awarded to pupils and at the end of the school year, we have an annual prize giving ceremony where individual pupils are rewarded prizes for Effort and Achievement in both secular and Islamiat subjects.

Sanctions

Maintaining good discipline is a key priority of the school and the school requests parents to co-operate by ensuring that their daughter is aware of the school rules and endeavours to abide by them. Please discuss the consequences of breaking school rules. The school's Disciplinary Policy is enforced swiftly in the event of non-compliance with any rules, particularly rude and disruptive behaviour. Please see the attached copy of **SCHOOL RULES**

Order Marks

An Order Mark may be given in Years 7 - 11 for various reasons, e.g. late homework, incorrect uniform, wearing jewellery, being rude, etc.

Detentions

5 Order Marks = 1 Detention

or a Detention may be given outright for serious disciplinary issues at the Head Teacher's/ Deputy Head's discretion.

<u>First 3 lates</u> = 1 Detention -30 mins.

An outright detention can be given for unexplained or inexcusable lates.

Any future Lates after the first detention will mean an outright detention every time.

Continuous Lates after this (= 2 further lates) = 1 hour detention for each Late.

The option of going home for lunch may also be taken away in order to improve punctuality.

Detentions take place after school on Thursdays unless stated otherwise. Parents will be notified by letter if their daughter has a detention.

Suspensions

If a pupil continues to misbehave after two detentions, she may be suspended from the school timetable for one day. Again, a letter will be sent to you giving notification. Any further breaches of the school rules after a timetable suspension will result in suspension from school.

Pupils returning from suspensions of any length may be put on **Report** for at least one week. The pupil will be monitored on behaviour/classwork/homework during every lesson. At the end of each lesson, the **Report** is filled and signed by her teacher, then checked by the Deputy Head at the end of the school day. Finally, the **Report** must be shown to parents and signed by them. At the end of the week, it will be forwarded to the Deputy Head & Head Teacher for further action they may take. Parents will be notified. Your daughter's future here will be in jeopardy if she reaches this final phase of suspension from school.

THE SCHOOL DAY

In order to cover the National Curriculum and Islamic Studies the school has a relatively longer day than any other school.

There are three ways of paying the school fees:

Standing Order:

You may complete the standing order form, which can be obtained from the school office and arrange for payment to be made on a monthly basis over 8 months straight from your bank account.

One Single Payment for Whole Annual Fee:

This must be paid before the end of September in the new term.

Payment in 2 Instalments:

First half of annual fee must be paid in September. Second half must be paid in January.

All payments must be paid by the end of April.

Regular and prompt payments must be made of School Fees which includes the annual Ofsted Inspection Fees.

The school should be notified immediately if fees cannot be paid on time or in the event of legitimate **Shar'ee** reasons, parents may apply for arrangements to be made from the Zakaat Fund.

In the event of not notifying the school and ignoring two written School Fee reminders, the governing body will have the right to enforce permanent exclusion.

Regardless of any holidays taken by the students all fees must still be paid in full.

Exam Fees:

The majority of GCSE Exam fees are included in the Year 11's School Fees. Pupils who wish to be entered for additional exams not included in school fees will be charged separately at the time of making entries or shortly after school is invoiced. Usually these may be for the extra GCSE Triple Science exam, ICT Functional Skills test or BTEC Home Cookery Skills.

Ofsted Fees:

Each year there will be a small charge towards Ofsted Inspection fees. The invoice is divided equally amongst all pupils on the school roll.

Curriculum Enrichment Week/Citizenship Day:

As from September 2016, the school introduced a mandatory curriculum Enrichment Week & Citizenship Day. Parents are expected to pay towards the costs of activities.

Other costs:

Pupils may be expected to contribute towards other small costs during the school year such as educational visits, homework diaries, locker keys, etc.

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1. INTRODUCTION

AASSG is an 11-16 non-selective school for girls under the proprietorship of Al-Madani Educational Trust. (Registered charity no 1134963). It serves students with varied skills and ability levels.

2. SPECIAL EDUCATION NEEDS & DISABILITY (SEND):

In line with the Equalities Act 2010, the school will consider all applications including applications from Special Educational Needs & pupils with disability. The school does not operate an admissions policy based on ability or aptitude except in cases of severe learning difficulties requiring specialist help or resources. In such cases, we will advise parents (in the best interests of the pupil) to apply at a specialist school where the needs of their daughter will be taken care of in a professional manner. If parents insist on applying at AASSG, they will be asked to contribute towards any additional costs.

Pupils not having SEND but with below average levels of attainment in English, Maths or Science and in need of additional out of class support will also be considered for admission. Parents will be asked to make contributions towards the costs of additional support. The school will determine the number of lessons and resources required based on teachers' assessment.

3. ENGLISH AS AN ADDITIONAL LANGUAGE (EAL):

The school is unable to cater for students who have recently moved to the UK and are not reasonably conversant with the English language.

An English language test will be administered for pupils with limited understanding of English. These are formal written tests and a non-refundable charge of £75 is payable in advance.

4. APPLICATION GUIDELINES

A maximum of 22 applications will be accepted in Year 7. Applications for other Year Groups (whether at the beginning or middle of the year) will be accepted depending on space and normal admission criteria outlined in this policy.

- 1. Applications must be made by completing the official Al-Ashraf Secondary School Admission Form, available from the school office on or after the Open Evening (date will be announced on school website).
- 2. Payment of £75.00 Registration Fee must be submitted with the Admission Form which is Non-Refundable unless the application is rejected by the school.
- 3. Applications will be accepted on or after the Open Evening. Not before.
- 4. Admission Forms should be completed accurately and honestly. False and misleading information may result in a pupil losing her school place.
- 5. School Fees must be paid promptly (including annual Ofsted inspection fees and other school charges). The school should be notified immediately if fees cannot be paid on time or in the event of genuine reasons, parents may apply for arrangements to be made from the special fund. (SF)

In the event of not notifying the school and ignoring two written school fee reminders, the Governing Body reserves the right to enforce permanent exclusion.

6. Active commitment to the school's rules and Islamic ethos. This includes non-Muslim pupils who respect and agree to abide by the school's rules.
